Minutes

Regular Meeting of the Board of Junior College District 301, Cook County, Illinois held at 799 West Kensington Road, Mount Prospect, Illinois on Thursday, March 24, 1966 at 8:00 p.m.

The meeting was called to order by Secretary Nicklas. In the absence of President Haas and the presence of a quorum, a motion was made by Member Hamill and seconded by Member O'Dea and unanimously carried that Member Hansen be appointed President Pro Tem. The roll was called by Secretary Nicklas.

Members present: Hamill, Johnson, O'dea, Nicklas and Hansen.

Members absent: Bernstein and Haas.

Also present: Jack A. Vandermyn, City Editor, Arlington Day, Dolores Gravity, League of Women Voters of Arlington Heights, Mrs. Gilbert Tierney, American Association of University Women (Arlington Heights), Duane K. Ainlay, Community Council of Wheeling, Alan S. Gage, High School District No. 224, Dave Crippen, Paddock Publications, Larry Frazee, Arlington News.

A motion was made by Member O'Dea and seconded by Member Hamill to approve the minutes of a regular meeting held on March 10, 1966 and the adjourned meeting held on March 17, 1966. The motion carried unanimously.

INVOICES

A motion was made by Member Hamill and seconded by Member O'Dea to approve the invoices as presented in the amount of \$23,898.97.

Upon the motion being put to a vote, the members of the board voted as follows:

COMMUNICATIONS

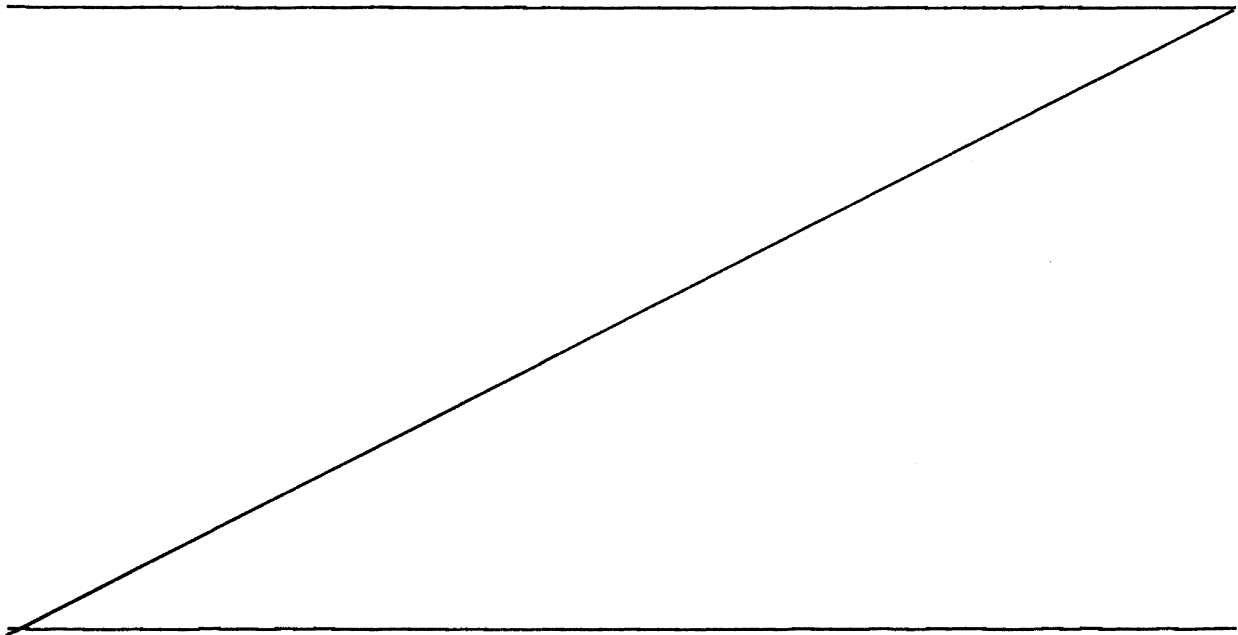
Member O'Dea received a letter from the Village President of the Village of Arlington Heights, inviting the Junior College Board to participate in the Planning Conference to be held in the Council Chambers of the Municipal Building in Arlington Heights, scheduled for March 26, 1966. Members Hanson, Johnson, and Nicklas indicated they would attend this meeting.

UNFINISHED BUSINESS

Attorney Hines presented to the board a purchase agreement dated March 24, 1966, relative to the acquisition of the Biddle property on Roselle Road, signed by both Mr. & Mrs. Biddle for a total purchase price of \$400,000 for 80 acres of property. Terms of the agreement stipulated that the initial payment would be made in the amount of \$500.00 (upon acceptance by the board) and an additional \$2,000 on or before June 1, 1966, the balance to be paid at the closing of the contract. The agreement also stipulated that the Junior College Board could rescind this contract on or before August 15, 1966 and if said action took place, the \$2,500 payment would be forfeited at that time. A final stipulation indicated that occupancy would take place on or before March 1, 1967.

The secretary read the following resolution:

The Board of Junior College District No. 301, Cook County, Illinois, agrees to purchase at the price of Four Hundred Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$400,000.00) the following described real estate in the County of Cook, State of Illinois, to-wit:

That part of the South one-quarter of Section 28, Township 42 North, Range 10 East of the Third Principal Meridian in Cook County, Illinois, lying East of Roselle Road, (except the East one-quarter of said South one-quarter).

and John C . Biddle and Eva Mae Biddle, his wife, agree to sell said premises at said price, and to convey or cause to be conveyed to the purchaser a good title thereto by warranty deed, with release of dower and homestead rights, subject only to:

1. General taxes for the year 1966 and subsequent years;
2. Building, building line and use of occupancy restrictions, conditions and covenants of record;
3. Zoning and building laws or ordinances;
4. Roads and highways, if any.

General taxes for the year 1966 are to be pro-rated from January the 1st, to the date of delivery of deed, and if the amount of such taxes is not then ascertainable, the pro-rating shall be on the basis of the amount of the most recent ascertainable taxes.

The purchaser has paid Five Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$500.00) as earnest money to be applied on said purchase when consummated, and agrees to pay Two Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$2,000.00) to be applied on said purchase price and to be paid on or before the 1st day of June, 1966 with the further sum of Three Hundred Ninety-Seven Thousand Five Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$397,500.00) to be paid at closing.

If purchaser defaults hereunder, then, at the option of sellers, said earnest money shall be forfeited as liquidated damages and this contract thereupon shall become null and void.

Payment of purchase price and delivery of deed shall be made at the office of the purchaser.

All notices and demands herein required shall be in writing. The mailing of a notice by registered mail to the sellers at 1501 South Roselle Road, Palatine, Illinois, or to the purchaser at 21 Park and Shop Lane, Elk Grove Village, Illinois, c/o Frank M. Hines, shall be sufficient service thereof.

Time is of the essence of this contract. The words "date hereof" mean date of delivery of this contract.

This contract and the earnest money shall be held by sellers, executed copy by purchaser, for the mutual benefit of the parties hereto.

Purchaser has the option of electing to have this matter closed in an escrow with Chicago Title and Trust Company, in accordance with the general provisions of the usual form of Deed and Money Escrow Agreement then furnished and in use by Chicago Title and Trust Company, with such special provisions inserted in the escrow agreement as may be required to conform with this contract. Payment of purchase price and delivery of deed shall be made through the escrow and this contract and the earnest money shall be deposited in the escrow account. The cost of the escrow will be paid by the purchaser.

It is further agreed as follows:

~~ER~~ Purchaser has the option of rescinding this contract by submitting written notice to that effect to the sellers on or before the 15th day of August, 1966, provided, however, that the sum of Two Thousand Five

Hundred and no/100 Dollars (\$2,500.00) shall be forfeited to sellers as liquidated damages and not as a penalty.

Sellers shall be entitled to retain possession of all of the buildings located on the subject premises (and reasonable access thereto) until the 1st day of March, 1967. Purchaser shall be authorized to enter upon the subject premises following closing, for the purpose of conducting tests and performing other work preliminary to construction of school facilities without being liable for damage to land or crops; however, possession of said buildings shall not be unreasonably interfered with.

Sellers shall not be required to deliver to purchaser a report on title or title policy and any expense incurred relative to such report or policy which may be ordered by purchaser shall be paid by purchaser.

In the event such report or policy is ordered by purchaser and it shall disclose any defects in title (other than such usual exceptions contained in such documents and other than the matters to which this sale is subject to in the terms hereof), then sellers agree to cure said defects upon receipt of a copy of said report or policy, title to be conveyed free and clear of any and all liens or encumbrances.

Purchaser may at its election take the title as it is then (with the right to deduct from the purchase price liens or encumbrances of a definite or ascertainable amount) upon giving to sellers notice of such election.

Sellers shall pay the real estate taxes which accrue in 1965 and are payable in 1966, on or before the due dates thereof.

Sellers retain the right to remove any and all improvements located on the subject premises on or before the 1st day of March, 1967.

It is understood and agreed that sellers have executed this contract only because purchaser possesses the power of condemnation, and it further is understood and agreed that the sale provided for herein would not otherwise be agreeable to sellers.

Purchaser assumes responsibility for the federal revenue stamps required by law to be affixed to the conveying document.

This transaction shall be closed on or before the 1st day of March, 1967, provided that if closing is prior thereto at which time sellers are in possession, the sum of One Thousand and no/100 Dollars (\$1,000.00) shall be retained until possession is transferred, which transfer shall occur not later than the 1st day of March, 1967.

Any crops harvested prior to the transfer of possession shall be the property of the sellers.

If closing is prior to the transfer of possession, sellers shall not be obligated to pay rent of any kind for the period that possession is retained following closing.

NEW BUSINESS

A motion was made by Member Hamill and seconded by Member Johnson to appoint judges for the Junior College Board of Election.

The motion was put to a vote and the members of the board voted as follows:

Aye: Hamill, Hansen, Johnson, Nicklas and O'Dea.

Nay: None

Whereupon, the president ruled the motion carried.

A lengthy discussion took place relative to identifying the junior college with the name of William Rainey Harper, first president of the University of Chicago. During the discussion, the name of Adlai E. Stevenson was brought to the attention of the board, particularly in reference to the 1965 Paddock Publications poll held in the junior college district. After considerable discussion, it was a consensus of the opinion of the board to take no action at this time but to place this item on the agenda for the next regular meeting of the Junior College Board.

Attorney Hines presented to the board a proposed employment contract to be used by both professional and non-professional employees of the junior college district. Considerable discussion ensued. Recommendations for the following changes were made:

1. Add the words "or by the board" at the end of Section 1.
2. Delete the words "and to devote all of his working time, labor, and skill" in Section 3.

On polling the board members, it was agreed that these changes should be made in the employment contract for junior college employees.

A motion was made by Member Johnson and seconded by Member Nicklas to adopt the junior college employee contract as amended. Motion unanimously carried.

Dr. Lahti discussed the Charge-back Principle for Students attending other junior college districts during 1966-67. In addition, he informed the board members as to the steps that were being taken to inform the students and boards of education of high school districts 211 and 214 of the related benefits for their graduating students.

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

The first item of discussion was the report on the new figures relative to the recently certified equalized assessed value of the junior college district. The 1965 equalized assessed valuation of both real and personal, and railroad property amounted to \$713,352,907.

The second item of discussion was the financial study presented by Municipal Research Associates, the financial consultants under contract with the Junior College Board. This study was a preliminary basic attempt to get at some of the more pertinent information for use by the financial committee and was not meant for public distribution. Detailed information will be available for distribution to the public at the time the economic data obtained by Arthur Little is integrated with the data from Municipal Research Associates.

Dr. Lahti also discussed the calendar of significant dates for purposes of scheduling meetings with the architect and the educational consultant for the months of April and May.

President Pro Tem Hansen asked if there were any questions from the floor. Mr. Gage, who represented the Citizens' Committee of High School District No. 224, Barrington, Illinois posed several questions to the Junior College Board:

1. When will the information from A. D. Little, Inc. be available for distribution and publication?
2. When will you, as a Junior College Board, need information relative to the possibility of adding territories to the junior college district so that this information can be incorporated with the future building plans of the junior college district?
3. The question was also posed as to the amount of thought given toward setting the tuition rate for attendance to the Junior College District 301.

Mr. Gage also indicated that the Township of Barrington had approximately \$100,000,000 assessed-equalized valuation which amounted to approximately \$57,000 of assessed valuation per student, with a total enrollment of 1700, including 388 seniors. Projected figures indicate that 1970-71 enrollment for the senior class of the Barrington High School will exceed the 500 mark.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

At 10:30 p.m., a motion was made by Member Johnson and seconded by Member Hamill to go into executive session.

The regular meeting reconvened at 11:30 p.m.

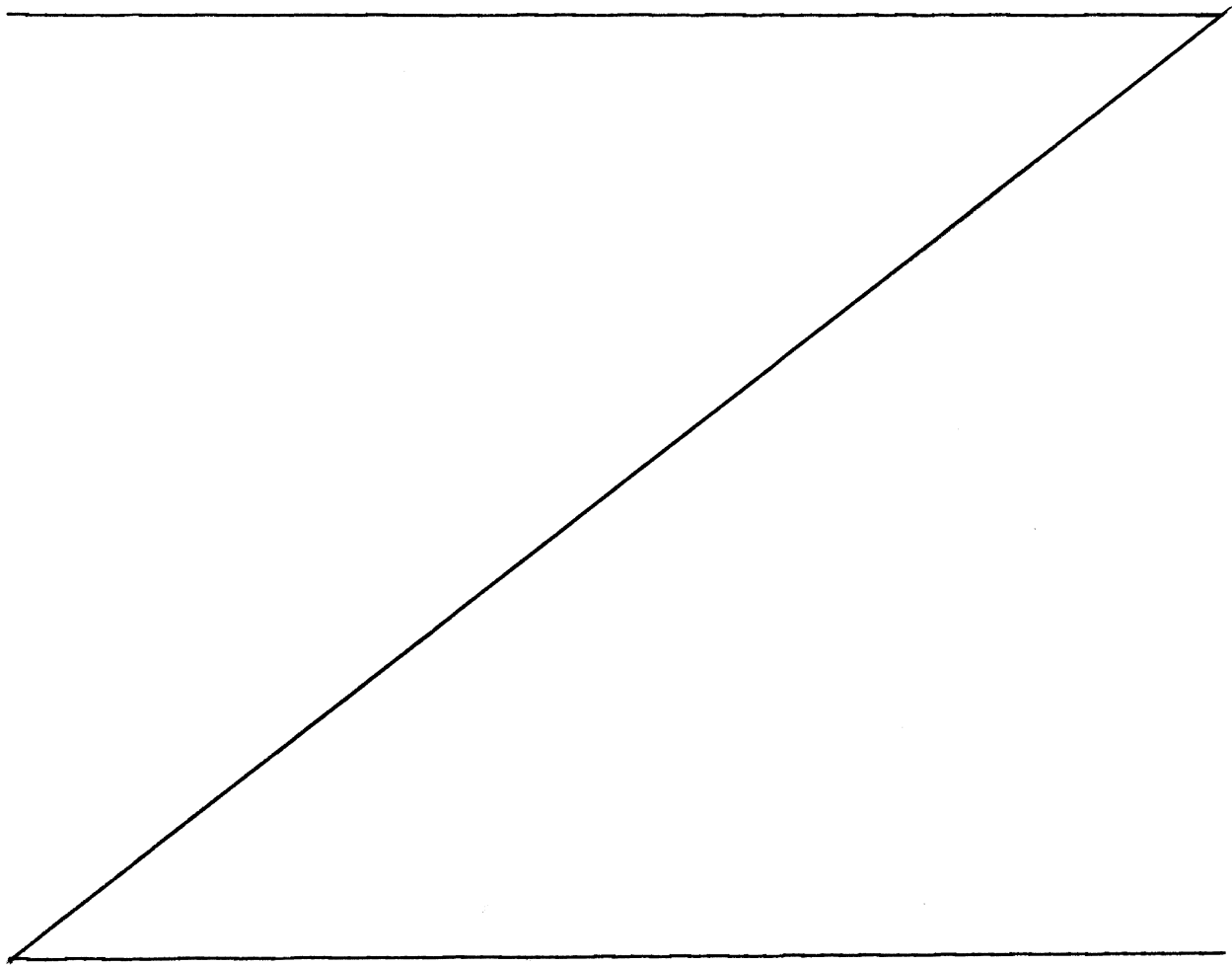





WILLIAM RAINEY HARPER

It should have come as no surprise to his classmates that William Rainey Harper, first President of the University of Chicago and the father of the community college movement, would have been counted among the intellectual giants of an age that produced Lowell of Harvard, Lange of California, and Folwell of Illinois. A college freshman at Muskingum College at the age of ten, Bachelor of Arts at fourteen, Doctor of Philosophy from Yale at nineteen, and full Professor Semetic Languages and Biblical Literature at Yale at the age of twenty-nine, Harper left a mark that ranks him with the top ten figures in American higher education. The fifteen-year period of his presidency saw the emergence of the University of Chicago as a leader in the movement to reform higher education, the principle of academic freedom clearly defined, the importance of both teaching and research established, and the way set for the flowering of the modern American university.

What he wrote to Mr. Rockefeller in 1890 when seeking support for the University did not over-state his case: "It seems a great pity to wait for growth when we might have been born full-fledged." In light of Harper's specific contributions, it does indeed seem that the institution was born full-fledged: The university extension service was founded, the four-quarter system begun, the University Press introduced to higher education, and the prestige of the teacher-scholar had begun a climb to a level from which it has never retreated.

While he reorganized the university and administered its many departments, he taught full time and served as chairman of his department. Few, if any,




