- <u>CALL TO ORDER</u>: The meeting of the board of Junior College District No. 512 was called to order at 8:14 p.m. at 799 West Kensington Road, Mount Prospect, Illinois, by President Haas.

The Board members expressed their pleasure at Barring- ton's interest in joining the Harper College District.

Member Bernstein entered the meeting at 8:30 p.m.

UNFINISHEDMember Hansen reviewed for the board a petitionBUSINESS:presented to the Planning Commission of the Village
of Palatine, requesting rezoning of land at the north-
west corner of Roselle and Algonquin Roads. The
rezoning request is for the construction of a gas


station and restaurant. Member Hansen felt this matter had not had sufficient discussion and indicated the board needed to further evaluate the situation. He stated that three board members did attend the zoning hearing but did not take a position due to the inability of the board to discuss this matter as a whole. He further stated that the Planning Commission had not made a final decision to date and felt that it was time for the board to take a position on appropriate zoning for the area surrounding the college site. President Haas indicated he had written to the chairman of the Planning Commission asking that a decision be held up until the board could take a definite stand on appropriate zoning for this area. Copies of this communication were sent to all board members.

Member Hansen explained in detail, the territory where rezoning had been requested and its location in relationship to the college site. He stated he was concerned about the zoning being requested because once established, it becomes irreversible. He further felt that, generally speaking, gas stations and restaurants are out of character with what is being planned for the college site. He felt that with this huge construction project under way, gas stations or other enterprises of this type should not be allowed to locate outside our "front door". Member Hansen presented a resolution stating the board's opposition to the proposed use of lots 4 and 5 for a restaurant and a gas station in that they would be incompatible with the present and future educational and institutional character of the area. The resolution requested the proposed zoning be denied.

<u>Member Hansen moved</u> and Member Bernstein seconded the motion to adopt the following resolution:

RESOLUTION OPPOSING THE PRE-ANNEXATION PETITION FOR REZONING LOTS 4 and 5, HOMEIER'S SUBDIVISION, PALATINE, ILLINOIS

(ORIGINAL RESOLUTION ATTACHED TO OFFICIAL COPY OF MINUTES)



UNFINISHED At this point, Member Hamill moved to amend the motion BUSINESS and incorporate a statement indicating that the board Rezoning, Lots 4 would use all of its financial and material resources & 5, Homeier's to oppose the zoning requested. Subdivision (Continued) The amendment was accepted by Member Bernstein but was rejected by Member Hansen. Member Hamill suggested that the junior college board in conjunction with legal council and our land planners, go to the village board to oppose this zoning. It was further suggested that we amend the motion to reopen the hearing to present further testimony. President Haas suggested the board pass this resolution and follow it with a motion to request the Planning Commission to reopen the hearing. Member Hamill withdrew this motion for an amendment. Member O'Dea moved to strike the words "gas station and restaurant" from the resolution and add "commercial zoning" which he felt would be more of an all inclusive control for the future. This amendment failed for the lack of a second. President Haas called for a vote on the resolution. Upon roll call, the vote was as follows: Haas, Hansen, Hamill, Johnson, O'Dea, Aye: Nicklas, and Bernstein. Nay: None Member Hamill moved and Member Bernstein seconded the motion to direct legal council to write to the chairman of the Planning Commission requesting they reopen the hearing on this zoning request in view of the fact that the entire board did not have time to hear all testimony on the "Hamburger joint". Member Bernstein moved to amend the motion to use the word "restaurant" instead of the words "hamburger joint".

Member Hamill accepted this amendment.

WHEREAS, the Plan Commission of the Village of Palatine, Cook County, Illinois, is presently considering a pre-annexation petition for rezoning certain Lots 4 and 5 of Homeier's Subdivision located at the northwest corner of the intersection of Roselle and Algonquin Roads in Palatine Township, to permit the use of said lots for a restaurant and gas station; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Junior College District No. 512, Cook County, Illinois, is the owner of more than 200 acres of real estate directly opposite and east of the said Lots 4 and 5, on which 200 acres is to be constructed an educational institution having a projected value of about \$30 million dollars; and

WHEREAS, all other property immediately surrounding said Lots 4 and 5 is also of an institutional character rather than a commercial character;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that this Board opposes the proposed use of said Lots 4 and 5 for a restaurant and gas station for the reason that it would be incompatible with the present and future educational and institutional character of this area, and hereby recommends and requests that the proposed rezoning of said Lots 4 and 5 be denied.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Secretary of this Board be and hereby is directed to transmit a certified copy of this resolution to the said Plan Commission of the Village of Palatine.

President Haas stated that it was time to sit down and develop a policy as to what our sphere of influence should be in recommending the type of zoning for the area adjoining the college site.

Member Hamill felt that in so doing, the board should sit down with the Palatine Planning Commission on this matter.

<u>Member Bernstein moved</u> and Member Johnson seconded the motion to instruct legal council to appear at the county hearing to oppose the zoning for a **c**ocktail lounge and restaurant in the area west of the junior college site.

Member Hamill suggested that the board establish a date to sit down with the Palatine Planning Commission to work out a detailed zoning plan.

Member Johnson suggested that Drs. Lahti, Perry, and Pankratz draft a recommendation as to what our sphere of influence should be relative to zoning surrounding the college site.

UNFINISHED Member Hamill felt we should obtain the professional BUSINESS, opinion of Caudill, Rowlett, and Scott and that Stephen Jurco, another zoning meeting should be scheduled prior to Rezoning March 22d. RECOMMENDATION FOR OPENING THE POSITION - SUPERINTENDENT OF BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS

Development to date indicates that there will be sufficient duties and responsibilities to warrant the appointment of an individual to this position during May or June 1967.

A brief outline of recommended duties and responsibilities will include:

- 1. To become acquainted with all architectural plans and working drawings to date, and keep abreast with construction developments related to the erection of the Harper College permanent plant.
- 2. To prepare specifications for the erection of our relocatable facilities at the Elk Grove High School site. This will include:
 - a. Site preparation
 - b. Utility services
 - c. Telephone services
 - d. Grounds preparation
 - e. Parking facility needs
 - f. Program of general maintenance and security
 - g. Begin investigation for the disposition of these facilities in 1969.
- 3. Supervise the planning and alterations necessary to provide for the data processing needs in the building on our permanent campus.

- 5. Develop space allocations for the building on our permanent site and further investigate the rental of storage spaces to surrounding private and public institutions.

- 7. Investigate and recommend the disposition of the buildings now located on the farm formerly owned by Mr. John Biddle.
- 8. Arrange for the receiving and the distribution of materials and equipment for the new relocatable facilities on the Elk Grove site.
- 9. Begin developing a program of operation and maintenance for the new college facilities.

RECOMMENDATION - POLICY REVISION - CHEST X RAY AND PHYSICAL EXAMINATIONS FOR EMPLOYMENT AT HARPER COLLEGE

Physical Examinations and Chest X rays - Pre-employment and Other

Present Board policy reads, "Physical exams and chest X rays are required of all personnel at the time of employment by the college. Such examinations shall be recorded on a form provided by the Board. The Board may require physical and/or a mental examination whenever a question of fitness may arise. Initial examination upon employment and examinations requested by the Board, will be provided at Board expense."

Regular medical and dental examinations and tests are the responsibility of the employee except when they are necessary as treatment for an injury or sickness in conjunction with college business or required in conformity with public health regulations. Employment is contingent upon successful completion of physical and X ray tests.

Recommendation for Modification of Policy

Physical exams and chest X rays are required of all personnel at the time of employment by the college. The physical examination shall be recorded on a form provided by the college. The Board may require physical and/or a mental examination whenever a question of fitness may arise. The initial physical examination (excluding chest X rays) upon employment and subsequent examinations requested by the Board will be underwritten by the college at a cost not to exceed \$20.00 per individual. Basic lab costs as part of the required physical examination will be assumed by the college. The chest X ray and the costs thereof will be the responsibility of the prospective employee. Employment is contingent upon satisfactory results of the physical examination and the chest X ray.

RECOMMENDATION - INTERIOR DESIGN LAYOUT CONSULTING - MOVABLE EQUIPMENT

As was discussed at the time of negotiation of an architectural contract with Caudill, Rowlett & Scott, and as per the terms of the present contract, consulting help for interior design and layout for movable equipment is not included. We do not have the staff capability to perform this function; therefore, we will have to call upon outside consulting help. Since CRS has a staff of interior design people who have worked on inside walls and furnishings, with the exception of movable equipment, it is my recommendation that we contract with CRS to perform this consulting help at a cost of two and one-half times the direct personnel expense, the total of which shall not exceed \$7,500.

Kaplan, Acting Secretary March marks the second anniversary since area voters approved the referendum establishing a community college district. It's been a busy, event-filled period. Much of the success and progress which has been made would have been impossible without the enthusiasm, wisdom and hard work of the Board of Trustees.

Attached is an Editorial Fact Sheet which pinpoints some of the important dates in the brief history of the college. We've also attached some data on the the Board members.

In light of the fact that this month is an "anniversary month," it may be you will want to consider a feature on the progress of the college and the efforts of the Board which made this progress possible.

In March, 1965, a community college district serving the Townships of Elk Grove, Palatine, Schaumburg and Wheeling was formed by means of a special referendum which was approved by voters three to two. On May 1, 1965, voters returned to the polls to elect from forty-eight candidates the first Board of Trustees for the new college district. These Board members elected include: John Haas (president of the Board), Abraham Bernstein, Milton C. Hansen, James Hamill, Richard Johnson, Mrs. Jessalyn M. Nicklas (secretary of the Board), and Paul O'Dea.

These Board members represent all four townships as well as the communities of Arlington Heights, Palatine, Elk Grove Village, Hoffman Estates and Prospect Heights. Planning for the community college goes back as far as 1950, with an active committee at work as long ago as 1961. In the fall of 1964, a petition was circulated by interested citizens so that the referendum could be held. Public response, especially among opinion leaders in the area, was enthusiastic. Significant events which have taken place since the formation of the new district include:

- May, 1965 College Board of Trustees meets for the first time, using Board offices of District #214. Temporary administrative offices are rented at 34 West Palatine Road in Palatine.
- June & July Board solicits various communities to indicate their interest in having the new college locate its campus in their areas.
- September Dr. Robert E. Lahti from Michigan is hired as first president of the new college. The Board had received forty-six written applications for the \$21,500 position.

October & November - Board interviews leading architectural firms for the

job of designing and planning the new campus.

- December Two outstanding architectural firms are selected Caudill, Rowlett & Scott, of Houston, Texas and Fridstein and Fitch of Chicago, to work in association. Both firms are respected and well known for their work in designing educational facilities.
- December Arthur D. Little, Inc. is retained to develop a ten year demographic and economic study of the district to aid in planning the curriculum and projecting the growth and the future needs ' of the college.

January Possible sites for the new campus are studied by the Board and the architects. February The college is approved as a Class I Junior College thus becoming eligible to receive state and federal funds. March Site in Palatine is selected for the future campus. April The college adopts the name "William Rainey Harper" in honor of the first president of the University of Chicago and the father of the junior (community) college movement. Harper was a leading educator and scholar of the last century. May Barrington residents express an interest in joining the Harper district. June Voters in the district approve the bond issue referendum authorizing Harper College to sell \$7.375 million in construction bonds representing the local share of the total building cost. August Budget of \$869, 838 for fiscal 1966-67 is approved by the Board. September \$3. 375 million in construction bonds are sold to the First National Bank of Chicago at an average interest rate of 4.3853 per cent. December Harper receives the first scholarship, a gift of the U.S. Gypsum Research Center employees, Des Plaines.

About the temporary campus:

Harper College's new campus should be ready for students by the fall of 1969 at the latest. Until then, all activities will be centered at the Elk Grove High School. Classes will be held Monday through Thursday from 4 to 10 p.m. About 75 classrooms are being made available to Harper, plus half of the space in the high school's library. Harper will supply its own books plus a professional librarian.

To house faculty offices, student lounges, book store, counseling facilities, and so on, Harper College has purchased eight modern, air conditioned portable units which will be located convenient to the main high school building. These facilities and the college library will be available to Harper students and faculty members well before the 4 p.m. class starting time.

In addition, the Elk Grove field house and gymnasium will also be made available to Harper students.

Harper administrative offices will remain headquartered in Palatine.

About the college student body:

According to the Arthur D. Little report, in 1967, total enrollment at Harper College will approximate 1,610 students, both part time and full time. This figure is expected to increase each year, reaching about 15,340 by 1980. Of the 1,610 students registering in 1967, about 930 will be part time. By 1968, with the addition of a sophomore class, the number of full time students will have risen sharply, from 680 to 1,220.

Although the ratio of part time to full time students will be high in 1967 (about 4 to 1), this ratio will drop gradually and will, by 1980, be about 2.3 to 1.

About the Harper curriculum:

Harper's first catalog is now being prepared and should be off the printing press by late April. Major areas of study listed in the new catalog include the following. Where the number of courses offered is especially large, this number is indicated in parentheses.

Anthropology, architecture, art (23), biology (13), business (30), chemistry, data processing (14), economics, education, electronics (12), engineering, English, French, geography, geology, German, history, humanities, mathematics, mechanical design, music (21), nursing, philosophy, physical education (33), physical science, physics, political science, psychology, Russian, social science, sociology, Spanish and speech.

About the new campus:

The architects are moving along with final drawings for Phase I of the new campus. This first stage of construction - to cost about \$12 million - includes a science building complex; a comprehensive library and learning resources center; a college center for administrative offices, data processing facilities, counseling and student related activities; a lecture demonstration center; and a fine and applied arts wing. In addition, a central utilities building is included.

In these early stages of construction, classrooms and technical programs will be housed throughout all the buildings. In this way, although space will be at a premium, the entire college student body can be accommodated at its new, though incomplete campus. The aim is to have the new campus in use in time for the beginning of the 1969-70 school year.
