Things you should know

Eligibility

All high school graduates or the equivalent are eligible for admission to the College. A nongraduate 16 or 17 years of age who has severed his or her connection with the high school system, as certified in writing by the chief executive officer (or designee) of the high school district in which the student has legal residence, or a non-graduate 18 years or older may be admitted if he or she demonstrates the capacity to benefit from programs and courses offered by the College. To be placed in some programs in the College, the applicant may be required to meet additional requirements as specified by that program.

College Credit from Other Institutions

Students seeking a certificate or degree from Harper College and wanting to transfer credits from another college should complete a Transcript Evaluation Request at the Registrar's Office, Student and Administration Center, A213. Students must have an official transcript from each college attended sent to Harper College's Admissions Office. Students wishing to use previous college level math, English, and other credits to fulfill Harper course prerequisites must bring transcripts or grade reports to registration and to the first day of class. Students do not need to request an evaluation for this purpose. Questions about previous college courses can be directed to the Registrar's Office, 847/925-6500.

Testing

Assessment testing is required of any student entering his or her first college level English or math course and must be completed prior to registration. The full assessment includes writing, reading and math testing, and it will take approximately two hours to complete. Photo identification is required. Please check the "Guide to Student Services" for Assessment Center hours.

Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI)

If you are a new student starting at Harper summer 1998 or later, you may be eligible to participate in a state-wide agreement called the Illinois Articulation Initiative (IAI) designed to help Illinois college students transfer easily. By earning the 1998 AA or AS degree at Harper, you will have completed a General Education Core Curriculum which is transferrable to more than 100 participating Illinois colleges and universities. Or, if you are not looking to earn a degree before transfer, you can complete just the Core Curriculum at Harper and know that your general education courses will transfer to the other participating colleges and universities. Limited Enrollment Programs

Enrollment in certain career programs requires admission to the College and fulfillment of specific requirements for admission to the program. (Contact Admissions Office, 847/925-6765 for details.) These limited enrollment programs are Cardiac Technology, Dental Hygiene, Emergency Medical Technician, Nursing (RN and LPN) and Certified Nursing Assistant. Some courses and sections which are offered only to students in limited enrollment programs are not listed in this course schedule.

Hope Tax Credit

For the first two years of college, you or your parents can claim a new nonrefundable 100 percent tax credit up to \$1000 of tuition and fees per year; and you can claim a 50 percent credit for the next \$1000. This tax credit allows you to claim tuition and fee expenses if you enroll in a degree or certificate program for at least six credit hours.

Lifetime Learning Tax Credit

This credit will be permitted for subsequent education. This is a 20 percent nonrefundable tax credit up to \$5000 of direct educational expenses paid. Other tax benefits may be available to students and families. Additional information on these benefits and other sources of funding is available from the Office of Student Financial Assistance, Student and Administration Center, A364, 847/925-6248.

Auditing a Course

A student who wishes to audit a course will be required to pay full tuition and fees and must obtain approval from the instructor, department chair or dean before enrolling in the class. Registration for audit status may be completed only during final registration the first week of classes and must be the original enrollment in the class. Students taking the class for credit are given priority.

College District

Annual Notice to Students

In accordance with Illinois law, Harper College maintains a file of course outlines for all credit courses included in this course schedule. Complete information is given on course content, methodology and objectives. The outlines are available for student review in the Division offices or in the Office of the Executive Dean of Instruction, Math,

Science and Health Careers Center, D129.

The following notice and information is given by William Rainey Harper College, District Number 512 to advise its students of their rights under the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act of 1974 (The Act).

The Act established the right of students to inspect and review their education records; provides that personally identifiable information will not, with certain exceptions, be disclosed without the student's written permission; provides for guidelines for the correction of inaccurate or misleading data through informal or formal hearings; grants students the right to file complaints with the Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act Office (FERPA) concerning alleged failures of the College to comply with The Act; and makes provisions for notice to the students concerning their rights.

A student who wishes to review his or her education records must complete the appropriate form and submit it to the Registrar. The student will be notified in writing of a date and time he or she may come to review the records.

The following student data is hereby designated as "Directory Information" and as such may be disclosed or released by the College for any purpose and at its discretion: Student Name, Home Address, Home Telephone, Major Area of Study, Dates of Attendance, Degrees/Certificates Earned, Awards Received, Last College Attended, Officially Recognized Activities, Date and Place of Birth, Weights and Heights of Members of Athletic Teams.

To have any or all of the "Directory Information" withheld, the student must give written notice, in person or by certified mail, return receipt requested and addressed to the Registrar by the first day of each course or program, as the case may be, for which he/she is enrolled.

William Rainey Harper College has adopted policies and procedures implementing The Act, which are contained in the William Rainey Harper College Student Handbook/Datebook.

Copies of The Act, William Rainey Harper College policies and procedures, the William Rainey Harper College Student Handbook/Datebook and forms for use in implementing the Act are available on request in the Registrar's Office, Student and Administration Center, Room A213.

Quick Guide to Admissions, Advising and Registration Summer 2000

NEW students

You are a "New Student" if you have not previously been admitted to and have never been enrolled in credit courses at Harper College. You will need to complete an application for admission before you register. Applications are available online, in the Admissions Office, New Student Services and Art Center, C101, or by calling 847/925-6700.

STEP 1

Complete the application for admission, and submit it and a \$25 nonrefundable fee to the Harper College Admissions Office. Degree-seeking students are also required to submit an official high school transcript or GED results and official transcripts from each college attended. (Non-degree-seeking students are not required to provide transcripts.)

STEP 2

You are encouraged to attend a new student advising session. These small group sessions last about one and one-half hours and will give you information about Harper College programs, services, admission requirements and registration procedures. They also include an opportunity for each group member to speak with an advisor regarding course selection. Call 847/925-6208 to reserve a seat and/or to get more information. Morning, afternoon and evening sessions are available.

STEP 3

If you plan to enroll in your first college level English and/or math course, you must take computerized writing, reading and/or math assessment tests. Test results determine your placement in those courses and must be completed prior to registration. You may be eligible for a waiver of testing with appropriate ACT scores and/or college transcripts. Contact the Center for New Students and Orientation at 847/925-6508, or the Assessment Center at 847/925-6541 for details.

STEP 4

Select class times and sign up for classes. New students can use e-mail, walk-in or operator-assisted telephone registration to enroll in courses. See page 6 for registration options and instructions.

STEP 5

Pay tuition and fees by the due date given to you at the time of registration.

If you apply to Harper for the summer session and plan to continue full time in the fall, please note that you will be invited to an orientation program which will include assessment testing, essential new student information, one-on-one counseling and registration.

Currently and previously enrolled credit students

As a "previously enrolled" student, you have already submitted an application, been admitted to and enrolled in a credit class at Harper College. You do not need to reapply.

STEP 1

You are encouraged to schedule an appointment in one of the academic advising centers for individualized academic advising, educational planning, information on transferring to another institution and/or to determine which catalog edition to follow. Call 847/925-6522 or 925-6393 for an appointment. (If you are blocked from registration because of academic standing, you must see a counselor before your registration will be unblocked.)

STEP 2

If you plan to enroll in your first college-level English and/or math course, you must take the writing, reading and/or math assessment tests. Test results determine your placement in those courses and must be completed prior to registration. You may be eligible for a waiver of testing with appropriate ACT scores and/or college transcripts. Contact one of the academic advising centers at 847/925-6393 or 925-6522 or the Assessment Center at 847/925-6541 for details.

STEP 3

Select class times and register. Currently and previously enrolled Harper College students can use walk-in, e-mail, touchtone or operator assisted telephone registration. See page 6 for registration options and instructions.

- · Enrolling in a course without satisfying the prerequisite may result in the student being withdrawn from such course at the request of the instructor. Refer carefully to catalog course descriptions or the course prerequisite information.
- Always use the numeral "0" and not the letter "o".
- *If no four-digit touchtone number is listed for a course, it means that the course requires special permission and you must register for it in person.
- · Enter your VISA, MASTERCARD or DISCOVER credit card number and expiration date. Remember to enter the # sign after you have entered your credit card number. The total amount of charges for all course entries will be charged to the credit card.

All students are encouraged to contact a counselor for academic advising (847/925-6522 or 847/925-6393) before using touchtone registration. 

Dropping college credit classes

- During the refund period, students who wish to drop one or more of their college classes for which they are registered may do so in the Office of the Registrar, Student and Administration Center, A213. To be eligible for a refund, students must withdraw during the refund period specified above. Refund based on the above refund schedule.
- The Business Office will disperse refunds by mail. Refunds will be processed by check, or, if payment was by credit card, applied to credit card account. Refunds will be processed within 4-6 weeks.
- After the refund period, a formal written notice to drop one or more full semester classes or to withdraw from the College must be submitted to the Registrar's Office in person by Thursday, July 13, at 8:00 pm. The student's record will show "W" for withdraw.
- Students who simply stop attending for any reason and who do not submit their written notice for dropping a class(es) will not receive any refund and are subject to an "F" grade.
- Students who have not officially withdrawn from a class(es) prior to the start of the term will be held liable for tuition whether or not payment has already been made.

Senior Citizen Discount is available to district residents 60 years of age and older. A 50 percent tuition discount is given for credit courses that are dedicated specifically to senior citizens. District residents age 65 years of age and older are eligible for a 100 percent discount for all credit courses during late registration. Late registration is the first day of the term or the first day of the session in which the class meets. This must be the student's initial enrollment in the class and there must be space available. Students may not drop and reenroll for the discount.

Educational Services Agreement

Businesses within the Harper College district can now offer Harper in-district tuition rates to employees who live outside the College district but within Illinois. The Educational Services Agreement Program permits these employees of in-district businesses to attend Harper classes at in-district prices if their employers have registered for this unique program. The indistrict tuition is available whether the cost is to be paid by the employees or by the company. Employers who are interested in this program should contact the Admissions Outreach Office, 847/925-6247.

Chargeback/Joint Agreement

Out-of-district students desiring to pursue a certificate or degree program at Harper that is not available at their community college may apply for a chargeback or joint agreement. If the application is approved, the student will be able to receive in-district rates. For further information call 847/925-6502.




Area and Extension Site Map







The ESL and Linguistics Department serves students from any language background. Student educational levels range from seven grades completed through completion of graduate/professional programs. Students with six years of education or less are referred to the Adult Educational Development Department for enrollment in the Nonnative Literacy Program

Both intensive and part-time programs are offered. All courses are held on the Harper College main campus in Palatine. Some courses are offered both daytime and evenings. Students receive college credit for sat-Isfactory completion of English as a Second Language courses, but for most courses this credit does not count toward a degree from Harper College. All students receive grades as in other college cours-

Registration

The ESL and Linguistics Department conducts its own registration sessions. Students are tested during registration and counseled for appropriate program and course placement. Registration is done by appointment only and takes about two hours. The number of registration appointments is limited because the number of spaces in classes is limited. In addition, a registration appointment does not constructed appointment does. not guarantee placement into a class. The earlier the registration appointment, the greater the pos-

sibility of getting into classes.

The opportunity for new students to call for registration appointments begins with certain dates before an upcoming semester or summer session. On those dates, appointments are scheduled in the order that the requests are taken until all available registration appointment times have been filled. After all appointment times have been filled, it is necessary to wait until the next call-in date in order to make registration appointments. Tuition and Fees

Tuition and fees are charged for all programs and are payable at the time of registration. Tuition for residents of the Harper College district is \$54 per credit hour. Tuition rates for those who maintain residence outside of the Harper College district or who are on student visas are higher than in-district rates. In addition to tuition, students must pay a student activity fee of \$16 and a registration fee of \$10. Some courses carry a language laboratory fee of \$20. New students (only) must also pay an application fee of \$25. All tuition and fee rates are subject to change. Please feel free to contact the ESL and Linguistics Department for current rates. Financial aid is available to eligible students through the Office of Student Financial Assistance. Students seeking financial aid are advised to contact the Office of Student Financial Assistance as early as possible. Students seeking to enroll in other college courses along with ESL courses should also make an appointment to see an ESL and International Student Advisor.

Intensive English Program (IEP)

This program is for beginning, intermediate and advanced students who want to improve their English language skills as quickly as possible. Emphasis is on the language skills and cultural knowledge needed for functioning in college and university courses in the United States. This program is also beneficial for nonnative individuals employed in business and the professions. Students must have completed a minimum of 12 grades of education in their countries or in the United States in order to qualify for the program. The program includes four instructional levels: A, B, C and D. All levels include courses in listening/speaking, grammar, reading and writing.
Students at Level A (beginning) enroll for 14 credit

hours of instruction and are required to attend class-es and the language laboratory Monday through Thursday, 9:00 am-3:40 pm. Levels, B, C and D include 15 credit hours with class and language laboratory attendance required Monday through Thursday, 9:00 am-3:40 pm.
