Due to her "inquisitive" nature, and a desire to get things done, she became an active participant in the Classified Employee Council. Recently elected President of the Council for a third term, Pones has nothing but praise for her hard working colleagues and the support she receives from her boss, Jack Lucas. Promotions Committee

Jack Tippens, chairperson, and a committee of eight persons are responsible for developing criteria for excellence. The promotions committee reviews all applications for promotion in rank and puts them in rank order. The list is submitted to the vice presidents and president, and then recommended to the Board of Trustees, who makes the final decision. The committee, made up of members from different disciplines, works continuously to make the ranking process as objective as possible. Points are assigned for all areas of criteria, including time in rank and service, professional growth and institutional and professional service. The committee recently simplified the application form and continues to work to improve the process.

Institutional Marketing

Chairperson Bruce Bohrer and a committee of 21 (with representation from all areas of the College, including two students) were very pleased with the response to the marketing effort. All employees have been invited to participate in meetings and asked to submit marketing strategies. The committee received 190 completed marketing strategy forms and expresses gratitude to the employees who took the time to submit recommendations.

Each suggestion is discussed by the committee and any financial and additional staff needs are considered and indicated on the strategy sheet. The committee will make recommendations in January to the Administrative Marketing Committee, chaired by Pat Bourke, for consideration in the '88 budget. A written report will be distributed to faculty and staff that will address each suggestion and the outcome. Some strategies have been, or soon will be, implemented. There were many good marketing ideas submitted which can supplement the existing marketing activities. Every suggestion will be given thorough attention. Bohrer commented that all submitted strategies were sincere and conscientious, with a lot of thought given to the overall effect on the College. The *Insider* will keep you posted on outcomes.

Focus on the Physical Plant

The Physical Plant Area is divided into five departments: administrative, maintenance and utilities, custodial, public safety, roads and grounds, shipping and receiving and the mail center. Due to space considerations, this month's *Insider* will focus on the administration and the maintenance and utilities department. Subsequent issues will feature the other departments that fall within the Physical Plant area.

Upon entering Building B, you will be greeted by Marianne Gasparaitis and Gloria Tokarz. When visitors enter the office of Don DeBiase, Director of the Physical Plant Division, they are surrounded by llons — in photographs, brass and ceramic — which he collects.

DeBiase came to Harper five years ago after doing similar work at School District 59, DuPage and Morton community colleges. Since DeBiase has been at Harper, there has been some staff reorganization and an emphasis on training for new employees and ongoing training for staff members.

Projects recently completed are the new sidewalks and new lighting on campus and in the parking lots. Most of the roofs have been repaired and chillers and boilers updated. Future projects will be a complete renovation of furniture, including desks and chairs, and enhancements to the climate control system. Preventive maintenance takes place on a regular schedule, and DeBiase frequently makes a walking inspection of the campus and asks his staff to keep their eyes open for items and areas needing attention.

DeBiase has much praise for "excellent personnel" and says that his position brings him much personal satisfaction.

Fortunately for Harper students, faculty and staff, the continuous productivity from Building B is directly tied into improving the working and learning physical environment. Plans are underway for improvements in the Honeywell 1000 climate control system. Other additions will include a new fire alarm system which will locate the source of a fire faster and with more accuracy, a better security system, and a system to conserve the use of electricity.

Carl Butterfield, Supervisor of Utilities has been at Harper since 1970. He had similar work experience with the State of Illinois and United Airlines. He began at Harper as a power plant operator, one of five in the department, when maintenance and athletics were housed in a converted horse barn. Butterfield reminds us that turning off lights when not in use may sound like a small savings in electricity but when multiplied by the numbers of lights on campus, the conserved wattage adds up to considerable dollar savings. The maintenance staff works hard to maintain and add conservation measures and is currently involved in readying the campus buildings for winter. The crew of 20 persons operates under the capable direction of Maintenance Foremen Robert Loitfellner and Darrell Richie.

The switchboard and power plant make up the Utilities Department. Chief switchboard operator Paula Blacker and operators Karen Collins and Mary Waskiewicz have been in their new quarters in Building B for one year.

The Prescription Card Service (P.C.S.) program is a new benefit being offered this year. The cards are currently printed with a code of C18 for dependents. This means that dependent children age 18 and under are covered under the plan. If you have dependents who are over age 18 and are full-time students, the card needs to be replaced with a C23, showing an age limit of 24 years.
