

Getting to Know Trustee John Coste

Along with administrators, faculty and staff members featured in the "Insider", there is another group of Harper people whose contributions are vital to the College. The members of the Board of Trustees, seven elected by the community and one by the students, bring a variety of interests and talents to their work of governing a complex community college. Through this column, you may come to know more about the issues facing the College and about the Trustees who are addressing those concerns.

Formerly the Village Manager of Schaumburg, John E. Coste was elected to the Harper College Board in November of 1983. "After being employed in Northwest suburban government positions for 20 years," he says, "I felt retirement gave me the opportunity to put something back into the area as community service," He noted, "Some people said I had strength in fiscal planning, and thought I could make a contribution as a College Trustee,"

Fiscal planning has remained a strong interest for Coste, who says "I think we've made progress, and of course, fiscal planning will always be a major concern for the Board."

on joining the Board in 1983, Coste discovered that the siscal condition of the campus was another area demanding immediate action by the Board. "Extensive repairs were needed to roofs and other areas of the buildings, parking lots, athletic fields. We've worked our way through most of the projects, while developing an ongoing program to avoid future problems," Coste added.


In regard to issues he foresees as important concerns for the Board in the next years, he notes, "The academic side is in good shape, and we'll want to assure that we continue to move ahead rather than fall back in that area. Meeting the needs of the community in continuing education programs will also become more and more challenging." He adds, "Questions facing the Board may be whether we can be everything to everybody, whether we have the ability to meet all the demands, and where we should put our emphasis. Factors influencing these decisions would be limitations of space, money and people."

In conclusion, he commented, "The College seems to be at a crossroads where important decisions will have to be made to assure continuing success and, we hope, excellence."

Insider's View of Larry Haffner

Larry Haffner arrived at Harper four years ago to serve in the newly-established position of director of the Academic Computing department. The director oversees and supports instruction-related computer equipment and labs. Haffner also serves as an ex officio member of the Academic Computing Committee, which was established in 1984.

The department now includes a staff of seven full-time and three part-time technical people, one secretary and between 30 and 40 student aides per semester. When Haffner arrived at Harper, there were about 100 microcomputers on campus. Now there are about 550, as well as one mainframe and three minicomputers.

Focus on Purchasing Department

Are you planning to buy new equipment for your classroom or office? Have you been searching for a specific item but are unable to find a source? The Purchasing Department is ready and able to help you.

Thea Keshavarzi, purchasing agent; Vicki Rowe, buyer; and Betty Parkhurst, secretary, are available to advise you. Catalogs and books are available in the department office as well. Because the College has a centralized purchasing system, requisitions for all items, goods and services are routed through the department, which issues approximately 4,800 purchase orders per year.

After a requisition is received in the department, an analysis is made to determine if the source suggested by the initiator is the best source. To make an informed analysis of the best quality goods and services at the lowest possible prices, Thea and Vicki actively search the marketplace, visit vendors and manufacturing facilities, and attend conferences and seminars. The lowest price is not the only determining factor—quality is a necessary requirement.

Harper is affiliated with an institutional cooperative for group buying power. Lower prices may also be found through State of Illinois contracts. Thea currently serves on the purchasing committee of the Illinois Association of School Business Officials. Bid items over \$5,000 are also handled by this department. Bid documents are prepared and mailed; bid openings are conducted publicly, often with the vendors present. After the bids are opened and analyzed, the recommendations are sent to the Board of Trustees for action.

The department staff was recently involved in standardizing carpet, paint colors, window coverings and furniture. Selections for these items are now made from a recommended list, as part of an overall plan to make the campus uniform and appealing.

With Thea's guidance, the department of available to serve. Students, faculty and staff are invited to attend this informative program which can complement curriculum in many disciplines.
