# Successful Soirée

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

I am often asked, "What sets Harper apart from other community colleges?" The answer is simple, "Our faculty and staff." I hope that we all recognize that our greatest assets are the talents and initiative of people working on behalf of Harper College.

A few weeks ago I accepted our fifth Illinois Community College Board (ICCB) Award for Excellence in Teaching/Learning. The ICCB Awards are presented annually to community colleges whose innovative and responsive programs and initiatives improve the learning process for students in Illinois. Harper has earned more ICCB

Awards than any other community college in Illinois.

This year the ICCB Award committee singled out the Algebra Reform Initiative curriculum taught by Phil DeMarois and Mercedes McGowen (TM/PS). Their use of technology, collaborative group work, and writing assignments enabled students to develop new perspectives about algebra. Using employment-appropriate tools such as a graphics calculator, they have enabled students to apply mathematical concepts and so better prepare themselves for today's workplace.

Board of Trustees member Kris
Howard is another individual who
was recently recognized for her
efforts. Kris has been named the 1995
Sears Distinguished Leader for her
many contributions of time and talent
which benefit the northwest suburbs.
As part of her award, Sears will grant
\$5,000 to Northwest 2001. As a
committed volunteer with Harper,
Northwest 2001, the National Board
of Girl Scouts of the USA, and many
other community organizations, Kris is
a deserving recipient of this award.

And this month Harper College was awarded the Well Workplace Silver

designation. Impressed with the scope of our employee wellness program, and its progressive holistic approach that provides for the diverse needs of the Harper population, the Worksite Wellness Council of Illinois evaluated our program as "excellent." Congratulations to Charlene Padovani, Wellness Coordinator, to our Director of Health Service, Rosemary Murray, and the entire staff of the Wellness and Human Performance Division.

# Have you visited the LRC lately?

LRC Dean Lee Vogel and Frances Dionisio take the last of the stored materials back to the LRC.







New carpeting, furniture, and lighting provide an inviting atmosphere throughout the LRC. There are browsing areas made up of comfortable seating adjacent to current magazines. Additional workstations are available. The carrels have always been a great place for quiet study, but now many of these also allow you access to audio and video materials. If you need a serene place for academic discussion, consider the Small Group Study Rooms. Also new is the Distance Learning Classroom. This facility allows students at several sites to participate in the same class.

New technology is everywhere. First Search is an on-line database providing access to millions of book and journal articles. Through the North Suburban Library System (NSLS) Database, you can search all holdings of 600 academic, public and special libraries. A variety of CD-Rom software including atlases, encyclopedias, literature, and foreign language subjects are available for reference and check-out. There is a large collection of fiction and non-fiction audio books in the circulation area.

Copy machines are conveniently located on both floors, and you can find a color copier on the second floor. Color copies are \$1 each.

On November 16, from noon until 4:00 p.m., the LRC invites all Harper employees and their guests to an Open House. There will refreshments, tours, door prizes and a drawing for historic library wing chairs.

With an educational background in math and computer science, and professional experience in the marg as well as the technical support of computer systems, Mel began teaching AutoCAD at Harper in 1988. Recognizing the corporate community's desire for UNIX training Mel quickly assembled a program, despite the very limited facilities that existed. The success of this project led to an expanded curriculum, which now includes training in Novell and Microsoft NT operating systems. As a result, Harper is now a Novell Authorized Education Center



#### Departmental Developments


