

Insider's View of Mark Mrozinski

Visit Mark Mrozinski at The Music Academy and his love for both teaching and music is apparent. Mrozinski grew up listening to his father play the accordion, so when Mrozinski was 10 years old it seemed only natural that he should learn to play it, too. "I became quite good at it, but I really had a burning desire to play the piano. My parents recognized this, and finally, when I was 16 years old, they purchased a used piano for me."

Mrozinski began piano lessons while in high school and continued to practice through college, eventually earning his master's in piano at the University of North Carolina. "My parents would have been much more comfortable if I had considered something more traditional like medicine, law or business for a major. But they recognized that music was very important to me, and they always supported my efforts.

"I don't know anyone who starts out as a performance major who has it in their heart to teach. My own experience while in school was that I was so focused on developing my performance ability that I never considered teaching as a career. But as I started teaching and experienced that, I really came to love it."

As the Director of the Academy, Mrozinski oversees a unique music school. The academy offers non-credit music lessons to students from 18 months old to adult. Born: Wilkes-Barre, PA

In addition to being excellent teachers, all instructors are required to have a minimum of a master's degree. Toddlers and their parents work together in Kindermusic[®]. Individual instrumental instruction is introduced when students are six years old. Guitar, piano, violin, voice and music theory classes are also offered. "We have a very developed piano program; the student takes one group and one private lesson each week. Many of our adult students studied an instrument as a child, lost interest, but now are back, anxious to learn."

Mrozinski is the newsletter editor for the Illinois State Music Teachers Association (ISMTA). This month Harper hosted the ISMTA convention, which was attended by 200 music educators from across the state. "This event is one way to make Harper's music program very visible. The educators attending looked at our facilities, heard our faculty play, and got a good overview of what we have. Independent music teachers are frequently asked to recommend schools to their students who seek a music major. If those teachers are aware of Harper's two year music degree and if they've met our talented faculty, they're more likely to send students here."

Mrozinski's favorite style of music remains classical, but "my favorite composer changes by the month. For a while it was Rachmaninoff, then Brahms, although lately I've been listening to the Beatles."

And more than Mrozinski's fingers move fast — this year he ran the 26.2 mile Chicago Marathon in 4:19.
